

Metalsmithing tips by Nikki Kenney

I think the secret to smooth edges, when etching copper tubing, is to put about a sixteenth, or eighth inch border of "resist" on the edge, before the end, on the end, and maybe just inside the tube. But first, make sure the ends are as smooth as you can get them before you put on the resist. That way, you won't scratch your finished piece by having to sand or file the edges afterward.

When planning to saw negative space in a metal piece, punch small holes in the corners inside the lines where the design needs to turn. Place your saw blade in one of the holes, and saw to the next hole. Then saw to the next hole, and so on. It eliminates the need to make sharp turns while sawing. Of course, this may not be possible in some intricate designs where the hole would extend outside the line to be sawed. Also, if you are using shears to cut out the basic shape of a piece, it helps to draw a square around the design as close to the outside line as possible, and cut off the corners. That gives you fewer turns to make as you are cutting. It is best to saw any lines that are more deeply concave. I have included a drawing to illustrate.

Call for Volunteers for Friends of the Park

Tishomingo State Park is considering reopening the historic park museum. The park museum was once a popular attraction but was closed due to budget and staff cuts.

Bob Marshall of Iuka, Mississippi, has offered his substantial mineral, crystal, and fossil collection to the Tishomingo State Park museum. Mr. Marshall's collection plus the current artifacts stored in the museum would create a small museum collection of interest to many.

With state park budgets tight and personnel in short supply, Tishomingo State Park depends on its Friends of the Park volunteers. Volunteers are needed to help prepare the old museum building for the new displays. Help is needed in cleaning the building, repairing the restrooms and air conditioning system, and staffing the museum on Saturdays during the visitor season. Individuals, scout, church, and school groups, clubs, and others are needed. The work is scheduled to begin in September 2015.
