Bead Soup: A place to talk "shop"! By Nikki Kenney

When riveting one piece of metal to another, tape the flat end of the rivet to the outside of the metal to hold it in place while you hammer the other end.

To make a wrapped loop to connect a bead, clasp, etc. to a chain, make the loop in one end of your wire, then



thread the loop through the link of the chain. Grasp the loop with bent nose pliers, having the tip of the pliers facing the back of the loop, thus enclosing the loop and the link of chain. Wrap the tail end of the wire two times around the loop. Clip the wire close to the loop, and file or crimp the cut end to ensure there is no roughness to snag clothing or scratch the wearer.

Liver of sulfur (LOS), when used cold, will give colors similar to the patina acquired with a torch, and has a look like oil on water. Just dip the item and rinse repeatedly until the desired effect is achieved.

An inexpensive plastic coffee filter with a nylon mesh basket will work in your pickle pot, or your LOS to contain small items such as findings and jump rings, thus making them easy to retrieve from the solution. The small plastic tray that comes in a jar of jewelry cleaner also works well, and the attached stem makes it easy to lift out of the solution. Line the bottom of the tray with a small piece of used dryer sheet, cut to size, to keep small items from falling through the holes. The basket or tray containing your small items can then be placed directly into the rinse water. Basket Photo by Nikki

Safety: Work safely so you can do it again By Mike Schuchs

Most snake bites occur in the spring and fall when both humans and snakes are more active together in the great outdoors. Now that the weather is cooling off, we are all thinking of good places to go rock hunting, and the snakes are looking for a good meal before they turn in for the winter. We need to avoid each other. You may not believe this, but it is a fact, that snakes are just as wary of you, as you are of them. The majority of snake bites are the result of people trying to catch, handle or kill a snake. No one has ever been bitten by a snake that they were running from.

It has been estimated that 7,000–8,000 people per year receive venomous bites in the United States, and about 5 of those people die. Most fatal bites are attributed to the eastern and western diamondback rattlesnake. Of the 6 US fatalities in 2015, 1 was a suicide by pet cobra, one was part of a church service, and the others either did not seek medical help, or received it too late.

Closer to home, Mississippi has had the occasional fatal snake bite. Here are a few tips for staying safe and out of the snake bite statistics:

- Hunt in groups of loud, stomping, noisy people. You don't have to sneak up on rocks. Snakes have no ears but can detect vibrations.
- Try to wear at least ankle high boots and thick socks. Many snake bites are on the foot or ankle.
- Loose fitting pants can help protect your legs.
- Never stick your hands in crevices, cracks or holes that you cannot see into entirely, and always look around before you pick up anything, as many more bites are to the hands.
- Avoid weeds and brush where you cannot see the ground well.
- Carry and use a stick, cane or pole to poke, prod and pry.
- Don't use the stick to attack the snake, just move away and warn others.
- If you do not have enough phone service to dial 911, make sure you have a plan.
- Avoid church services that use poisonous snakes.

These tips are generalized for rock collecting. There are other tips for hunters, swimmers, fisher folk and people that work in the outdoors. If the pretty rock you are about to pick up is long and tapered, use a stick!
