Meeting Program Reviews:

Did you know that Mississippi contains a fossil deposit of hadrosaur dinosaur bones? At the October meeting of the North Mississippi Gem and Mineral Society, NMGMS member Dave Hanes presented his "Fossil Discovery" program based on a fossil site in Prentiss County, MS. This site was mapped and excavated by Dave along with George Phillips, paleontologist with the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science. Dave had an excellent slide presentation showing the deposits at this local and he mentioned that many of the fossil bones already were greatly deteriorated, due to the reaction of marcasite (an iron pyrite) on the fossil material. Despite the disarticulation of the bones, Dave and George were able to recover many pieces. Dave displayed a beautiful fossil rib bone, toe bones and to top things off, the jaw bone of an infant hadrosaur (duck bill) dinosaur! Many of the fossils recovered are presently at the museum in Jackson waiting to be restored and cataloged. Wow, wouldn't you have liked to have been able to view what that part of Mississippi looked like back during the Upper Cretaceous, when these creatures were living here along the coastal edges of the Mississippi Embayment (Selma Sea) and its barrier islands? Well, maybe, from a distance?? Nancy Roberts

<u>Safety is a state of mind and should be first in any of our plans.</u> This month's safety word is GFIC.

If you exclude the outdoor hazards of collecting and field trips, there are only a few instant disasters that can befall us in our lapidary hobbies. Electrocution would be at the top of the list. Our club is about to embark on a new adventure with saws and grinders to create things of beauty. The equipment is driven by electric motors; the work and grinding surfaces will be cooled with water, not a perfect pairing.

Here is the rule to work safely in this case:

Before turning your machine on, insure that it is plugged into a GFIC device and into a properly grounded 3 prong 110v plug. If you are not sure of what you find, wait and ask someone else to verify the proper connection.

A ground fault circuit interrupter (**GFCI**) or Residual Current Device (RCD) is a device that shuts off an electric power circuit when it detects that current is flowing along an unintended path, such as through water or a person.


