When you think of our great state, you normally don't think of it in terms of rocks and fossils, but if your basement or garage is anything like mine, we know better!

On a final note, we have started to take measurements of room #136 over at the Link Center and to make some determinations, as to a good layout for our new lapidary setup. Through the generosity of our fellow members, we are acquiring some furniture, such as a desk, a workbench, chairs, filing cabinet and a few other items. On Saturday, Feb. 13th, members that are handy with tools will be moving some of these things over to the room and also assembling a few counters for the grinders and saws to sit on. Meeting Program Reviews:



Earthquakes: Natural and Manmade

Dr. Terry Panhorst presented NMGMS members at our January meeting with a very enlightening program on earthquakes. Dr. Panhorst discussed what causes earthquakes, the scale presently used to classify them according to the damage that they inflict and then he went over the history of earthquakes in Mississippi. He also talked about the New Madrid Fault and why it is such an active area for earthquakes. When we were shown the earthquake hazards map and took a look at where we are in relation to that fault line, it had some of us "shaking" in our seats! We even talked about earthquake insurance! Dr. Panhorst then went on to explain how similar underground pressures can result from man's activities in the oil and gas drilling business. One thing, that I did not realize, was how much salt water is extracted in the drilling process and that this water was pumped back underground for disposal. The pressures created underground from this disposal procedure can cause "manmade" earthquakes! Oh, by the way, I do carry earthquake insurance! Nancy Roberts

The following is a list of the display cases that NMGMS will be setting up at the ODCM starting March 17th:



Due to a large donation of assorted rocks, fossils and minerals, from Floy Hawkins, we can fill many more grab bags!

Any NMGMS members, who like to sew, please take a look at this cloth bag. We could use some more made up for the grab bags that we sell at our events Instructions: Cut an 8x15 inch piece. Notice how it's sewn; You'll sew the casing for the draw string first and then do the side and bottom seams. Make seams half inch, so the finished bag is approx. 7x7 inches. Experiment, they don't all have to be exactly the same size or configuration, just colorful and enticing!!!!!!!!!! . I sew a ¾ inch turn for the yarn first (with the yarn already in place). Fold in half, then sew the bottom & up the one side, stopping before the yarn tube. Good luck and thanks! See Marion's article for step by step photos!

Several pieces of crinoids were found, as well as a shark tooth. I found a very small ammonite; my first one from the Mississippian era! After a lunch break at the local quick stop, we went on over to the second site and found some nice blastoid specimens there. We also ran into fellow collector and author, Richard Keyes, who had some copies of his new book, Fossils of the Tennessee Valley. NMGMS Jan. 9, 2016 Meeting Minutes, cont'd: **Old Business:**

*The club is planning to set up a fossil display at the museum focusing on findings in Mississippi counties. Specimens on loan for display should be labeled with the county in which it was found. Mike Schuchs will be providing a petrified wood display, covering the stages it goes thru in becoming petrified. The "rocks like food" will be revamped, so if you have new pieces, please bring them. Specimen loan sheets were distributed to the group.

*For the geology day, members were asked to bring something for the "hands-on" table. The club will set up the fluorescent room, the fishing game, the sandbox dig, leather and bead lapidary project, and the spin and win. The geode cracker will be back again, as well as Pat Arinder and his artifact display. George Phillips will also be on hand to id fossils. There was discussion on the club being allowed to provide cookies and/or hot dogs. Dana Armstrong is certified to handle/serve food. The decision was to include serving food since there will be a certified handler available.

*A mixed metals class will be taught by Kim St. Jean on Saturday, Jan.23rd at the Women's Center on Gloster Street from 9 a.m. to 5p.m. The class fee is \$100. All materials and tools needed for the project are provided. Lunch will be served.

*Filing to become a 501©3 organization will cost \$400. The club is reviewing the required forms and agreed further discussion will be needed before a decision can be made.

*There was energetic group discussion regarding the available rooms at the Link Center. Cost ranges from \$285 to \$400 per month rent. The room with some storage cabinets and a small bathroom for \$285 was of great interest to the group. The Link Center requires a 3 month lease and is willing to let the club have the room for \$120 a month for 6 months, if club members help with maintenance and renovation projects at the Center. David Loyd volunteered to assist in painting, dry wall installation and various maintenance projects when needed. Mike Schuchs has picked up the grinding equipment and is currently storing it for the club. Dave Haynes requested a business plan be drawn up to support the expense of leasing the room at the Link Center. Discussion moved to suggestions for income sources. Art Councils in the surrounding area are requesting the club to schedule lapidary workshops. Members could set up at area flea markets to sell donated lapidary projects and do some demonstrations. Hold scout merit badge classes in the spring and fall with a charge of \$10 per scout. The motion was made to lease the space at the Link Center & schedule a workshop for February 13th by Mike Schuchs; seconded by Robert Langford. Motion carried with a unanimous vote. No further old business at this time.

New Business:

The clubs renewal with the Southeast Federation is due. The club ended 2015 with 98 members, so the renewal fee to SFMS is \$196.

The February meeting will be at the library on February 20, 2016 from 1 to 3p.m. The program will be given by Julian Riley, a local area collector and historian. His focus will be on specimens he has collected in the area creeks and a history of 20 Mile Creek. If there is enough time members will begin filling grab bags. Part of the March meeting will be to fill grab bags and fishing cups.

A lapidary workshop at the Link Center is planned for Feb. 13th to do the "Alex and Ani" bracelets and a wire wrapped cage for a polished stone. Kit fee to be determined.

The SFMS February 1st quarterly meeting will be hosted by the Mississippi Gem and Mineral Society (MGMS) on February 26 and 27, 2016 in conjunction with its annual MGMS Gem, Mineral, Fossil and Jewelry Show on February 27 and 28 in Jackson, Mississippi.

We have been invited again to set up an exhibit table at the MAGS show, April 23rd and 24th in Memphis. The club again has permission to offer cookies/cupcakes to sell. All proceeds would go to the club.

Other new business: Mathew Lambert was awarded the Jr. Rockhound of the Year award. Britney Lambert was awarded the Certificate of Merit. The club presented Dr. Terry Panhorst with a set of Fossil Cycad Bookends from Barstow, CA. and an Agate Geode from Wiley's Well CA. Motion to Adjourn....

NMGMS Board of Directors Meeting Minutes

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the North Mississippi Gem and Mineral Society was held on Saturday, January 9, 2016 from 1:30 to 2:10 pm @ the Lee County Library in Tupelo. The meeting was called to order by the president of the club, Nancy Roberts.

Members Present: Nancy Roberts, Nikki Kenney, Belinda Loyd, Brenda Manning, John Byzet, and Mike Schuchs. The motion was made to approve the November board meeting minutes. Motion Carried.

Treasurers Report: The treasurer presented the expense report for 2015. Monies in \$4718.77 – monies out \$3354.65 leaving an income for 2015 of \$1364.12.

Discussion: How to file the long form for obtaining the 501c3 nonprofit status. It was brought to the board's attention that several area gem & mineral organizations have filed the long form that didn't require the National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities (NTEE) code. One organization the 1023EZ form and used code U30. This code requires the organization to establish a scholarship fund. There was group discussion to determine what code the club would use. Social club vs U30 code. Decision was tabled until next meeting. There was additional discussion regarding the club being incorporated since 12/18/2013 which is approximately 25 months and if the club files before the 27th month there is the possibility of the 501c3 status being retroactive to Dec 2013.

Board members discussed how to increase the club's income and reduce the expenses. Several suggestions such as: 1) charging for snail mailing copies of the NUGGET; 2) flea market sales; 3) scout merit badge classes; etc.

Renting the space at the Link Center was discussed further. Some concerns were brought before the board such as who would do the reciprocal work to offset the rent; responsibility for the keys; involvement during the summer months; who would teach/help with classes; etc... Some in support of the lease would be to have all of the club items in one place; great space for workshops; community exposure; the possibility of a future gem & rock show. It was decided to put the discussion before the members for a vote.

Adjournment: Meeting was adjourned at 2:10 pm.
