They will certainly work with us, as we strive toward getting a lapidary workshop set up. Several other positive notes about being at the Link Center are, that we would have a place to set up some permanent displays, a place to store all of the clubs tools, beads, and other jewelry making materials, a venue for holding our own classes, lapidary art shows and sales, and at some point, a small rock and gem show of our own. At the Link Center, we would be right in the "heart" of the local artistic community.

If NMGMS decides to locate at the Link Center, we will still continue to serve and support the community through our involvement with the Oren Dunn Museum, the Lee County Library, and the West Point Arts Council. We will still work with the area scouts and strive to expand our involvement with other community groups throughout north Mississippi. Remember, education is our top priority. All of this will take a lot of hard work on the part of our NMGMS members, but it will open up new opportunities for our club and its members. It will help NMGMS to grow in a new direction over the coming years, while continuing all of the programs and activities that have made NMGMS such a fantastic organization.

Do it safely so you can live to do it again.

Just because it is pretty, does not mean it is tasty. Some people have a habit of licking rocks to wet them in order for the details and contrast to show. This practice might be fine in some places, but it highlights an issue that needs to be addressed in lapidary work. Some rocks are poisonous by degrees.

Detroit agates, such as Fordite, are made from layers of over-sprayed paint on automotive assembly lines. The older layers or chunks could at the least contain lead, but all layers contain chemicals that should be handled carefully.

Unlike the gravels and river rocks in our area, some of the rocks from the western US can contain selenium, mercury, arsenic, and even radioactive heavy metals. That does not mean our gravel is hazard free, it just means that different levels of safety practices need to be observed.

We have acquired lapidary equipment that we hope to phase into our club's program this year. It is important that any material brought in for sawing and grinding be properly identified and handled safely, for your health and the health of others. Make sure that enough water is on the work to eliminate all of the dust. Whoever draws the short straw for cleaning out the mud trap on the drainage system needs to keep in mind that the mud is far more dangerous than the rock. Wash up afterwards and don't lick anything.

If you are cutting copper tubing into small pieces, first smooth the cut end, so that you will have only one end to finish. To make the new cut end easier to smooth, find a wooden dowel or chopstick that fits the tube, if it is graduated, so much the better. Slip the cut copper tube onto the dowel with the freshly cut end nearest the pointed end of the dowel. Then roll the dowel along the edge of a salon (sponge) nail board, twirling back and forth, with the cut edge of the tubing riding along the edge of the salon board. Use the coarser side of the board first, then turn it over and use the finer side. You will feel the end of the tubing becoming smoother, when you check by rubbing your finger along it.
