Notes from the President's Desk.....December 2017

Happy Holidays! Another great year for NMGMS is coming to a close. In looking back through last year's newsletters, I see were we have made great strides with our lapidary room at the Link Centre. Last December we had our workshop room set up and had three saws in working order, one 12 inch slab saw, a 10 inch slab saw and a 6 inch trim saw. As of this December, we have added another 6 inch trim saw, a 14 inch slab saw, and one more 10 inch saw. We also have the Genie cabochon machine running, as well as two other cabochon machines with their own water cooling system online and running. We purchased some lights for the cabochon machines and a stand for the donated Flex Shaft. After holding several slab saw and cabochon workshops in the room, NMGMS now has a few members who are gaining confidence and getting more proficient at cutting and polishing their stones. I would like to encourage more of our fellow members to take advantage of this great opportunity.

Speaking of taking advantage, NMGMS has enjoyed the use of the upstairs conference room at the Link Centre for jewelry workshops. So while the cab machines and slab saws are humming along downstairs, the upstairs halls are ringing with the merry sounds of hammers banging away on copper. Club members learned a variety of metalsmithing techniques this past year, from using copper brazing rods, to soldering, riveting, dapping, and using a disk cutter. Join us next month for a great class on the art of etching copper.

Another area where NMGMS has made great strides over the past year is with our junior group, the Rockheads. Last December Jim Roberts awarded 5 junior members with the badges that they had earned through the American Federation's FRA badge program. This December he will be awarding badges to 15 of our junior members. Wow, that's a BIG change. One more Rockhead will appear on the AFMS honor roll as having earned the Rockhound badge. I am hoping that the Rockheads will continue their good work, and maybe one, or several of them, will earn the title of "Rock Star" by getting all 20 of the FRA badges from the American Federation. Up Coming NMGMS Field Trip: December 16, 2017

The December field trip will be to Richardson Landing which is located about 20 miles north of Memphis, TN and 10 miles north of Millington. We will assemble in the Popeye's parking lot at **9:00 am** Central Standard Time on Saturday, December 16th and then caravan to the collecting site.

Assembly Time: 9:00 am (CST) at the Popeye's located in front of Walmart, 8845 U.S. 51, Millington, TN.

NMGMS field trip leaders are Mike Schuchs and Nancy Roberts. Please notify Nancy if you are planning to attend, so that we will be sure we have everyone before we head out to the site.

Collecting will be on the gravel bars. Material will be agate, jasper, chert in multiple colors and banding, fossil chert, and petrified wood. Rare finds include Lake Superior Agates, Ice Age fossils such as horse and bison, and mastodon has also been found in the area. Material is excellent for tumbling and lapidary work.

Wear boots or water proof shoes, or bring a change of shoes and socks. A walking stick is helpful, or a stick with a metal point, which is good for checking for petrified wood, as it will sound like glass when poked. No digging is required. Also recommend a backpack, fanny packs, and/or plastic buckets. Be sure to pack a lunch, hat, sunscreen and drinking water. We will be doing a lot of walking!

NMGMS Field Trip: January 27, 2018 to Alabama

The first NMGMS field trip for 2018 will be on **Saturday, January 27th** to collect Mississippian fossils from the Bangor Formation. We will be collecting fossils such as bryozoans, blastoids, brachiopods, and corals. We will meet at the gas station/convenience store in Belgreen, AL on Hwy 24 and 187, approximately 17 miles east of Red Bay, AL. at **9:00** a.m.

Bring small containers, cardboard flats, and a bucket for carrying your fossils and gear. Newspapers, paper towels, or aluminum foil are recommended for wrapping up those

that are fragile. A rock hammer, chisel, and something to pry with are also handy to have. Wear boots or shoes that can get wet or muddy, and bring a hat, water, sunscreen, safety glasses, etc. A backpack or extra bucket is good to have, since we will be walking and carrying our gear with us. Bead Soup: A place to talk "shop"! By Nancy Roberts

Here's a trick we learned while working on the copper disk bracelets: When you are punching the outer holes in your disks so that you can connect them with jump rings, you want those holes to line up with each other and be across the center of your disk. First, place the disks on lined paper or graph paper using the outer edges of the disks and the lines on the paper to gauge the center of your disk. Then, mark one side for a hole and following that same line across, mark the other side. This method worked very well.



Copper Etching Class, January 13, 2018

If you would like to learn how to etch designs in copper metal for making jewelry pieces, this is the class for you. Come to the Link Centre in Tupelo on **Saturday, Jan. 13, 2018**, upstairs in the conference room from **10a.m. until 4p.m.** Etching is a really fun process, and the results are very exciting and make unique components to include in your jewelry creations. We will be working with a variety of copper "blanks" and also some wire, so you should be able to complete a pair of earrings and a pendant or bracelet. We will also be doing some stamping, texturing, and shaping of some copper washers and wire for making links and other components for these projects. It'll be loads of fun!! Because

we will be working with chemicals, please wear old clothes or bring an apron. Bring a brown bag lunch. There is a refrigerator available. The class is limited to 12 students, so sign up early. The **\$30** class fee includes all materials, chemicals, and use of the tools.

Lapidary Words: Test Your Knowledge! By Nancy Roberts

Answers to November's words, Enameling and Etching:

The art of enameling has been around for centuries. The enameling that we would be doing in our copper jewelry workshops is fusing powdered glass onto copper metal using very high heat. This fusing process can be done with a torch or in a kiln. Upon heating, the powdered glass melts and flows, forming a vitreous coating that hardens when cooled. The powdered glass comes in a wide variety of colors, as well as opaque and translucent finishes. There are many different techniques that you can do with enamels, like layering, stenciling, sgraffito, cloisonné, etc. Enameling allows the jewelry artist to add color and texture to their pieces,

making it unique and one of a kind.

Etching metal is also a very old technique. Acid is used to cut or "bite" away exposed places on a piece of metal. A "resist" is used to protect those parts that will not be etched. In our workshops, we use ferric chloride as the acid to etch copper or brass. You can also make your own etchant using one part commercial grade Muriatic acid (dilute hydrochloric acid from the hardware store) and two parts hydrogen peroxide (like you buy at the drug store). We have used Sharpie markers and StazOn ink as resist with great success. The design to be etched can be applied to the metal freehand with a Sharpie marker, or stamped on with rubber stamps using the StazOn ink. Designs can also be applied to your metal using PnP (Press and Peel) transfer paper. The design to be used is preprinted onto the

paper with a laser printer. You can also etch metal with electricity and an electrolyte solution like salt water, silver nitrate, or copper sulfate.
