<u>Historian</u>: (Susan Curry) Please start saving any 2011 photos, newspaper articles or other club memorabilia for next year's scrapbook. Floy Hawkins and Annette Kelly have been working very hard to put together a club scrapbook for 2010, so that we can enter it into the American Federation's "All American Club" competition. The 2010 club scrapbook is on display. Floy Hawkins explained to the group that more items should be saved for archiving. Items needed are club flyers; show flyers; photo's from field trips; community involvement information; school and scout activities. Any involvement that is gem, mineral, fossil and collecting related should be noted and saved. Scrapbooks have requirements for each section such as club participation in legislative issues and community involvement.

<u>Newsletter</u>: (Robert Langford) There is a website and newsletter called S.C.R.I.B.E. and it provides help and support for gem and mineral club newsletter editors. With the \$6 per year subscription, the editor will receive the newsletter and a DVD full of information, tips, clipart and all kinds of things that can be used in the publication of the Nugget.

A motion was made to pay the subscription fee for Robert Langford. **APPROVED and second**The club funds have purchased a portable flash drive for Robert. It will provide storage for the Nugget's digital files and any additional club files.

<u>Youth Members:</u> (Kendal Bullock) Ask Kendal to talk about the possibility of NMGMS doing a Merit Badge Day for the Scouts next year. At the last meeting, we were asked to check over the badge listings on <u>www.meritbadge.org</u>

Kendal Bullock explained the Merit Badge Day and answered questions from club members regarding badge qualifications. He presented two proposals for club consideration: 1) Offer $\frac{1}{2}$ day event as a group or 2) offer an all day event and share the expense $\frac{50}{50}$ with a local area scout club.

Mr. Bullock suggested the club participate in an all day badge event and share the expense. The scout club participating would provide the location and any tools that would be needed.

A projected per person fee of \$15 with approximate \$5 per person profit after expenses. There is an approximate 6 month prep period for the event and funds raised would be used to support the club events and/or expenses for the next year.

Kendal explained the general processes involved in offering a $\frac{1}{2}$ day vs all day badge event. Usually 2 merit badges per scout are offered. It would offer 2 – 4hour sessions (a morning and an afternoon session). Eight hour courses can only earn 1 badge.

Motion to participate for TBD date in April 2012- APPROVED and seconded Motion to do with a group for all day – APPROVED and seconded

Old Business:

1. W.C. McDaniels sent me information concerning setting up a booth at the MAGS Rock and Gem show which is on April 23 and 24^{th (}*Easter weekend*).

MAGS will provide a 6 or 8 ft covered table with chairs in the exhibit area. It will need to be occupied Saturday 23rd from 9-6 and Sunday from 10-5. We would need to bring info and handouts about our club and also any kind of displays. Club members helping at the booth will receive free admission to the show. We will need members to volunteer to man the booth and we will also need displays, posters etc.

If you are interested in doing something for this, there is a sign up sheet on the back table.

Several members volunteered to help at the MAGS Rock and Gem Show on April 23rd and 24th. Cheryle Langford; Bernice Burkeen; Nancy Roberts and David & Belinda Loyd

- 2. We are still scheduled to do a basic introductory beading class in Starkville on Saturday May 14th and will need a few volunteers to help out. (so far, Floy, Nikki, Beth and Carolyn Price) We will be putting together the kits sometime before the class, so if you are willing to help with that please let me know. I have already purchased the materials for the kits. We will also need lots of "samples" of our work to show the class. Floy, Nikki and Nancy plan to car pool. The class requires a minimum of 5 participants in order to be held. Members interested in taking this class will only be charged a kit fee of approximately \$10.00. Kits will be available at the beginning of class. Helpers will meet prior to the event to assemble the kits. Nancy will let the helpers know of the meeting location as soon as plans are finalized. The workshop announcement will be advertised in the West Point paper.
- 3. Rae Mathis was excited when I mentioned that we were interested in having our rock swap coincide with the Oren Dunn Museum's fall festival. She wondered if we were interested in setting up on the museum grounds. If we do that, we have to have some kind of educational display or activity for the kids. We could possibly do a fossil dig or the "fishing" game. We would need members to provide specimens (fossils and rocks).

At the last meeting, we discussed advertising the event in the local papers and we voted to have hot dogs and chips provided by the club.

If the club agrees to have the rock swap on the museum grounds it will save the \$50.00 rental fee for the pavilion. Suggested activities for children could be a fossil dig; fishing game or fossil rubbing.

The possibility of using easy-ups would allow the club to have the rock swap as a picnic event; be separate from the museum but close enough to be associated with the fall festival and still save the pavilion rental fee.

At the previous meeting it was approved that club funds would be used to provide hot dogs and chips. A motion was made that club members would provide drinks and deserts. **APPROVED and second**

Advertising for the Rock Swap will be sent to Chris Keiffer and Ginna Parsons for the Daily Journal. A suggestion was made to run a notice in the Courier. Notices will include an invitation to other gem and mineral clubs to attend.

New Business:

- 1. The April 16, 2011 NMGMS meeting will be held at the Union County Heritage Museum in New Albany, MS. Ms. Jill Smith, the museum director, is planning a short program and a tour for us and the museum will handle the refreshments. We will hold a short meeting there. (See email notice and the April Nugget for directions) It's suggested to follow the museum signs once you get to New Albany.
- 2. Member, Souzen Deavers, is president of the West Point/ Clay County Arts Council this year and she has requested that we consider doing a window display for their building in downtown West Point. We could "advertise" the club and show some of the things that we do in our workshops. Maybe have it be a "make it with rocks" theme? Any ideas? I have a bunch of gem trees that I could loan them. The display would be set up for one month. Valuable items could be removed each evening and returned to the display area the next morning. There is no cost associated with having the display there. Floy Hawkins asked Mathew Lambert to present his science fair exhibit to the club. Mathew placed 1st in the Corinth School District's Science Fair. His project was on fossils of Coon Creek. His exhibits included a mosasaur vertebra and a rare tiny crab. Floy has submitted Mathew's name for a Junior Rock Hound Scholarship offered by the Southeast Federation.

Floy shared with the group an incident that occurred during a show in Florida. It has prompted some concerns regarding liability insurance coverage. Nancy looked into acquiring insurance under the SFMS umbrella. The insurance would protect the club and members against damage that may be caused to another party (person or property). Club members acting on their own (not club organized events, field trips etc), are NOT covered under this policy.

She plans to meet with Rae Mathis regarding concerns of liability during the Rock Swap. A motion was made to request the SFMS show liability insurance if needed. **APPROVED and second**

<u>From Tupelo or Memphis</u>: Take Hwy 78 to New Albany and get off at exit No. 64 onto Hwy15N/30E. Heading north, go 1.5 miles to first traffic light after the high school (Eagle Gas/ Be Quick on the corner) turn left at the light onto Highland Street and look for the brown museum sign and a green NEMS community college sign. Take the first right onto Garfield Street, and then at the stop sign, turn left onto Cleveland Street. Continue on Cleveland and at the second stop sign, turn left onto Washington Street to park at the museum.

From Iuka or Corinth: Take US Hwy 45 South towards Tupelo. Then take the Hwy30/Wheeler exit and turn right onto Hwy 30 West. Go approximately 25 miles to New Albany to the traffic light at Hwy30/15. Go straight at the light and take the first right onto Garfield Street, and then at the stop sign, turn left onto Cleveland Street. Continue on Cleveland Street, and at the second stop sign, turn left onto Washington Street and park at the museum.

SFMS Liability Insurance

Liability and insurance can be complicated and confusing issues in their own right; add unscrupulous individuals and greed to the scenario and these issues can be downright scary. Ever since a discussion about the lawsuit against a Florida club came up at the SFMS executive meeting on March 12, 2011, rock and mineral clubs, as well as, federation chairpersons have been reevaluating insurance needs, coverage and liability.

I have been in contact with Gene Roberts, the Southeast Federation's insurance chairman, and he has been very helpful and informative. It is my understanding, that the membership insurance that we carry thru the federation covers us at our meetings and field trips. According to Mr. Roberts, guests to our meetings are covered but not on the field trips. It is also my understanding, that if we hold an NMGMS sponsored event for members only, like an outdoor picnic or a trip to a museum, we would be covered. If we, as a club, participate in an event sponsored by another group, then we need to be sure that we would be covered under their insurance, for example, the Christmas parade or a city festival. If we, NMGMS, sponsor an event where we have invited the public to attend, like a rock swap or show, then we would need to purchase the extra "show" insurance that the federation offers. This insurance is only good for the day or days of the event itself. The cost of this insurance is \$175. Application needs to be made for each event and the cost would be adjusted depending on the number of events to be held per year. We can apply for this insurance any time before the event. As I continue to work on understanding this issue and find out more information about our insurance coverage, I will keep our membership updated.

Stepping Back in Time!

Hi fellow club members! It is such a joy to visit Tucson without the hustle and bustle of the Tucson shows. I had forgotten how beautiful Tucson is without white tents littering the town.

I have come to spend some wonderful quality time with my father. I am also enjoying leisurely visits with other family members scattered throughout the state.

And why not take in some of the attractions including The Glass Onion, the 'hottest hippie café in town' and San Xavier, a national landmark and the finest example of Spanish Colonial architecture in the United States?

On one of my excursions, I stopped by Jay's (bead store) on Speedway. While chatting with the owners, I discovered they opened the year that my father sold his business here. That shopping spree landed me at Discount Agate House (**DAH**), my father's old business. Wow! Talk about stepping back in time.

Then it was Discount Agate House, the second largest gem, mineral and lapidary business in the states.

As I walked through the tailings of rough in the open rock yard, memories came flooding back. It was once one acre of sprawling buildings with workshops and one additional acre of head high piles of rough. Over four million lbs. of rough rock were available for anyone and everyone to dig through. Remnants of the 500,000 lbs. of Mexican rainbow obsidian and American petrified wood lay on the ground along with Mexican geodes. A small sign read \$6 a pound. A far cry from the seven and half cents a pound they fetched in the 70's.

As I passed these small piles of geodes, my mind drifted to the day I got to go with my father to pick up a load. He had a warehouse in Juarez and we would drive the semi down and get the rocks stored there. This was usually a trip for my brother, but this day I was the chosen one. He even let me sit on his lap and "drive" (hold the steering wheel) on a desert road. But that was our one secret – a secret my mother was never to know!

As I rounded a corner, BAM! The old band saw was just sitting there, tempting me to pick up a six pounder and start slabbing. Uh, but this wasn't my playground anymore.

That saw was actually my brother's pride and gem. A scrawny little toe headed boy with a learning disability would eagerly run up to a customer with a rock in their hand and say, "I'll cut your stone for a nickel mister." Then would eagerly take the rock and run to the large band saw and go to work. Proudly he would look over his shoulder at the customer and grin. When he finished, he would say. "You can go inside and they'll finish it for you." Who could resist such a cute freckled faced kid?

One could try their own hand at cutting the rock they picked. Geodes fuelled the curiosity of most of the customers. Was it solid or hollow? Rarely one might find a dud known as 'mudballs'.

Many customers took their slab home to cab it themselves. But that wasn't necessary. They could go to the studio, or "workshop" as we called it, to have local artists cab your new slab and finish it into a piece of jewelry. This was done by one of the many on-hand silversmiths. Gold was an option as well.

The artists, many of which were cousins and American Indians, were rewarded for their work with raw materials, a studio, and a portion of their designs going back to them. Outside artists and native Indians from the US and Mexico were offered a similar trade. They would take the rough and return weeks later with finished pieces and the cycle would continue. Most of these artists spoke no English.

That studio was where my sister and I cut our teeth in cabbing and silver smithing. Remembering a costly mistake I made on a silver and turquoise bracelet, I was quickly reminded that this was my sister's area of expertise, not mine.

I could still see the workbenches and hear the chatter. I drew in a big breath and my eyes started to refocus. The studio of my childhood, the rows of work benches, artists, tourists and customers had been replaced with modern shelving and strands of manufactured beads. A kind lady with white hair offered a genuine greeting and just for a minute I thought it was my mother.

As I stepped into another room, metal shelves, newer versions of the ones I remembered, now showcased spectacular minerals, fossils, and other delightful treasures. Not that a version of the same wasn't there before – but that was all off limits for a small child.

The next area was lined with packaged tools, a few sheets of silver, banding and wire. Not as many as I had remembered. Back then there was a never ending supply. My dad would say," Save those tid-bits. Don't throw any of it away". Melting the scraps into nuggets for "nugget" jewelry was a job for us beginners.

No more were the tumblers constantly churning and mumbling. Not small or large, hobby or commercial, I didn't even see one for sale.

Then I spotted it. The little basket of rubies from India, the small tray of native turquoise now mixed in with Kyanite and other new age stones. All of them neatly tucked away behind glass showcases. Were those the same ones I used to hide under when my brother got too annoying?

Gone was the water tourmaline and lapis. Four to five days of mule and horseback riding though Pakistan would lead my father into Afghanistan, where he would negotiate large purchases of Lapis Lazuli.

A lone flat box, we called them "beer flats", still remained under one of the shelves. A dozen or so malachite ashtrays were loosely laid upon each other. These ashtrays, from the Congo, were a 2-6 pound chunk of malachite with a shallow scoop carved out of the top, leaving 3/4ths of the rough malachite untouched. A voice in my head was saying, "Forget the ashtray, let's cut the malachite." That was truly the intended purpose. Malachite rough could not be exported from Africa during those years. My father cleverly disguised the rough as ashtrays – making it a finished product. Finished products made from malachite *were* exportable.

As I left, I purchased a small piece of snowflake obsidian, probably a remnant of the 200,000 lbs. of obsidians my father brought in from Utah. My memories start to fade as I walk out the door. The store seemed SO big as a child. Was it, or had it just lost its enthusiastic lapidary artists and crafters?

Several tourists came and went during my walk down memory lane. But no one of the profession graced my presence. This is where we, fellow club members, cabers, faceters, collectors and jewelry makers need to share our knowledge and skills. Then maybe, just maybe, one day there will be a need for an oversized and overstocked Discount Agate House in every state.



Brad Smith's "BENCHTIPS"

Emery Boards

The sanding boards for doing your nails are one of my favorite finishing tools. I use the ones with a thin foam core. They have enough resistance to sand just the high points off a flat surface and yet give a little when you're trying to smooth off a curved surface. Plus they're inexpensive and come in a variety of grits. Some grits are so fine they give an almost finished surface. Pick up a few at a beauty supply company or at your local dug store.

Dental Floss

When testing the fit of stone in a bezel, it's all too easy to get it stuck. Often the only way to free it is to drill a hole in the bottom and push it out with a needle. To avoid this, lay a piece of dental floss over the top before you press the stone in. Then just pull on the string to remove the stone.

<u>Follow-Up to the NMGMS Field Trip to Vulcan Materials Quarry, Parsons, TN, Saturday, March 12th</u>

"I feel like a kid in a candy store!" That just about sums up the way one feels when you see all of the plentiful varieties of fossils at the Vulcan quarry in Parsons, TN. Saturday, March 12th was a perfect day to be out at the quarry too. It started out a little on the cool side, but warmed up quickly with plenty of sunshine. Besides NMGMS members in attendance, we were joined by members of MGMS out of Jackson, MS and the Ozark group, OESM, from Mt. Home, AR. There were 33 eager fossil hounds in all!

This time, after gathering in the office to sign in, the quarry personnel requested that we take pictures of each of our groups for their records and possibly to be printed up in their Vulcan newsletter. As we drove back to the collecting area, we were all dreaming of crinoids and giant trilobites.

It looked like we might have been the first group in to collect so far this year; no other footprints to be seen! There were a vast number of crinoid stems, corals, brachiopods, bryozoans and trilobites that had weathered out over the winter. The junior members of our expedition were able to fill a bucket full of crinoid stems in a matter of minutes! I challenged them to find the longest crinoid stem that they possibly could by saving all of the pieces that went together and then gluing them back when they got home. I wonder who actually got the longest one. ???

There were a few less common fossils found that morning too; a rolled trilobite and a few crinoid calyxes were collected. I found an unusual cystoid calyx and Joy Rushing found a nice "corkscrew" Platyceras. It was such a gorgeous day and the collecting was so prolific, that the time went by rapidly. None of us were ready to pack it up and

quit at noon. Many of us joked about wishing that we could camp out in the quarry for the weekend! We definitely want to try and get another trip in before the end of this year.
