Guest and members gathered just the same, Some members couldn't join us on this fun day,


We hope ill health didn't keep them away, The dollars added up when bidding on rocks, fossils, and the Kitsch,

The West Point/Clay County Arts Council teamed up with the North Mississippi Gem

and Mineral Society to bring a beading workshop to town. Several West Point Arts Council members attended a beading workshop the Society taught in neighboring Starkville last spring and wanted to offer their town the same opportunity.

So on a crisp October Saturday, 15 women assembled at the First Methodist Church to learn to make a one-strand necklace, bracelet and a pair of earrings, instructed by NMGMS president Nancy Roberts. Society members who travelled to West Point to help with instruction included: Floy Hawkins, Clarice Turner, Bernice Burkeen, Nikki Kenney, Kathy Westbrook, Linda Lodato and Beth Parker.

Workshop participants praised the quality of the bead kits, which featured a variety of stones and copper in fall colors, and the instruction, which encouraged each woman to design her own look with her bead selections.

The beading workshop was the first in a series of crafts workshops planned by the Arts Council, according to NMGMS member and Arts Council president Souzen Deavers Steelhammer. Winter workshops will include pine straw basketry, quilting and photography.

Enthusiasm ran high for the beading event, and discussions are in the works to host a second workshop, incorporating wire work. Cost for the beading event was \$30 a person, which will help the society provide a full week's scholarship to William Holland in 2012

The October 15, 2011 field trip to the Memphis Stone and Gravel Company's Senatobia, MS facility was an incredibly fun and exciting trip for all in attendance. Being a Dixie Mineral Council sponsored field trip, NMGMS members got to meet and mingle with fellow rockhounds from other SFMS associated rock and mineral clubs. We met folks from Atlanta, Montgomery, Nashville, Jackson and beyond. What a great bunch of people to spend the day with; the weather was perfect and the site was phenomenal. This was the first trip to the gravel site that I had been able to make and "oh, my gosh", the piles of gravel where enormous! Climbing to the top was nearly impossible, as you would slide backwards in the loose gravel more than you were able to move upwards. But the collecting around the bottom perimeter was just as good as at the top, so everyone, no matter what their physical condition, was able to find fantastic pieces. This type of collecting is like no other that I have done before; the gravel pieces were large, already washed and just waiting to be picked up. You could fill a bucket in no time! Jaspers, agates, petrified wood and fossil imprints were numerous. There was great tumbling rough to be collected too, for those who like to polish rocks. MAGS provided an excellent cookout lunch of hamburgers and hotdogs for everyone and we had the opportunity to swap some rocks and fossils with the other clubs. I managed to exchange some Silurian sponges, Astraeospongia, for some Diamond Hill Skeleton Quartz crystals! We all hated to stop collecting, but by 3 in the afternoon, after a sunny "day at the beach", we were ready to load up and head for home. All in all, it was a great field trip, well attended, productive and fun for all. Our car was much slower going home, with all of that weight in the trunk!!!! Parsons, Tn Vulcan Quarry Field Trip for Saturday Dec. 3, 2011

Remember, under-age children need a waiver signed by the parents to enter the quarry (form below). We will be meeting in the quarry office at 7a.m. to sign in.

NMGMS Field Trip: To the Vulcan Quarry in Parsons, TN on Saturday, Dec. 3rd

As always, the quarry personnel have requested that I call again several days before the trip to verify that they will be open on that Saturday and can let us in to collect.

So watch your emails, or give me a call prior to Dec. 3, 2011.

This facility is huge and we have a very large area in which to collect. Be prepared to do some climbing, as some of the tailings piles can be a bit steep. There are plenty of easier collecting spots along the quarry roads where we will be. The Devonian fossils are very abundant here. You can't help but step on them! Large crinoid stems and some calyxes, many brachiopods, bryozoa, several types of coral and quite a few trilobites can be found. No one goes home empty handed!

Plan to meet at the quarry office(small stone building with the radio antennae on top and inside of the stone entrance) at **7a.m. Saturday morning** to sign in and then be escorted back to the collecting area. **The quarry closes at noon**, so after a lunch stop at the Hardees in Parsons, we will go down to the Hwy 69 road cuts near the TN River where I have collected trilobites and other Silurian/Devonian fossils. If you would like to spend Friday night at the Deerfield Inn in Parsons, the # is 731-847-4700. Rooms are \$52.99 plus tax per night. There are several campgrounds in the area also.

The Vulcan Quarry requires that all underaged children MUST have a waiver that is signed by a parent before they will be allowed into the quarry to collect, so be sure to fill out the one provided and bring it with you, if you have children attending this field trip. We all have to sign the quarry waiver when we get there. Call or email me if you plan to go and give me your cell#, so if for some reason you are not there by seven, I can let the office personnel know who is yet to come. Thanks, Nancy Roberts 731-689-5336 H or therockhoundlady@yahoo.com Quarry phone # 731-847-3211 I will also have copies of the waiver available at the Nov. 19th meeting.

Directions: From Tupelo

Take Hwy 45N heading to Jackson TN. About 13miles N of Selmer TN at Henderson, you will come to a 4 way stop where Hwy 100 crosses Hwy 45 (this is now a traffic light). Turn right (head east) onto Hwy 100. Take Hwy 100 to Hwy 69 in Decaturville (approx. 30 miles). Turn North (left) onto Hwy 69, heading to Parsons, TN. The quarry is on the right side of Hwy 69 north of Parsons, approx 3 miles N of the Hwy 69 /412 intersection in the town, or about 2 miles N of the Deerfield Inn. (you will see a lot of dump trucks entering the quarry). Report at the office to sign in.

<u>Directions from Pickwick TN</u>: Take Hwy 128 over the Pickwick Dam, heading toward Savannah. Before you get to Savannah, turn right onto 226, take this Hwy to a "T" stop at Hwy 64. Turn

right onto 64, heading east. Shortly after you pass the Savannah Vulcan quarry, turn left onto Hwy 128N. Take this to a "T" stop at Hwy 114. Turn left onto 114. This takes you over the TN River bridge. Stay on this Hwy114/69. About a mile or two after the bridge, Hwy114 goes off to the left DON"T TURN stay straight (this is now Hwy 69N) Take this all the way to Parsons and the quarry. Parsons is approximately 20 miles north of the Tn River Bridge.

Optional Directions from Tupelo: Take Hwy 45N to Corinth. Turn onto Hwy 72E and go to Hwy 25 in luka. Take Hwy 25N all the way to Hwy 57 in Counce and at the stop sign there, turn right, go over the dam and then follow the directions from Pickwick to Parsons.

<u>Directions from Memphis</u>: Take Interstate 40 east toward Nashville. Take exit#126 onto Hwy 69 S towards Parsons. The quarry will be on your left just as you are entering the outskirts of Parsons. (Approx. 8 miles S of I40)
